Faye Berryman AM (Member of the Order of Australia), by Phillip

"awarded for significant services to education, literacy and community"

Congratulations to Faye on receiving the AM. What a happy surprise! Faye has a long list of contributions to education, literacy and community. Her list of accomplishments are long and many, not least the founding of Fitzroy Community School, the creation of the Fitzroy Readers literacy method and the education of many hundreds of children over more than four decades. In all of her work with children, she has ability (and love of literature), social skills and self-confidence. Fave has also trained over 500 student teachers during her teaching career.

> Faye (and Philip's) Fitzroy Method for literacy started with the writing of the stories in a framework that incorporated a clear and logical introduction to our language. It is hard to summarise a life's journey in a snapshot, but here are two snippets. One is Faye's joy when a tiny tot gains the ability to read

their first story. Faye, in sharing this first step to literacy sparkles with joy and enthusiasm in her retelling. Another special moment in her journey as a literacy warrior was the time she spent in a youth detention centre. The English teacher there was successfully using the Fitzroy Readers and wrote to Faye that it would mean a lot to the young men there if Faye could visit. These young men were excited in their achievement and the progress they were making with the Fitzroy Readers after many years of failed academic pursuits. Faye's work has lifted the literacy of unknown thousands of children.

Last year brought the launch of Fitzroy Community School - The Book in China, where it quickly gained a greater readership than in Australia, and is helping bring many new schools and new ideas into the Chinese education landscape. Another accolade is the many educators inspired and supported by Faye in the opening of their own schools. John Marsden heads a significant list of Australian principals who credit Faye with inspiring and supporting him in opening his school. Finally, a big thank you to the anonymous nominees, those who put Faye's name forward for this honour. Congratulations Fave Berryman AM, on recognition well deserved.

A VISITOR, by Ru Efron (Brunswick St Biggie)



Solomon has written a powerful poem reflecting his response to the circumstances in which the Uyghur people of Xinjiang region find themselves:

Head down, shoulders slouched. My spirit beaten like a wild horse subdued by the bite of the whip. They know my name, they know my face, they know my prints, they know my gait.

Shuffling, eyes glazed, down camera lined streets, prey, under the eyes of the dragon. Surveyed with endless malice. Searching, searching, for a hint of dissent.

I have nothing, naught but the sanctuary of mind. But what was secure, is now under siege.

This body a veil, that cloaks within, a swelling tide of convulsing ire, burning my soul, a raging fire.
